Ricker Library of Architecture & Art Unit Annual Report, FY2021 Submitted by Emilee Mathews, Head, Ricker Library of Architecture & Art

I. Unit Narrative

Major Accomplishments:

In FY2021, the Ricker Library of Architecture and Art accomplished the following major initiatives:

- Hired the Visiting Design and Materials Research Librarian
- Was awarded an Innovation Fund grant for "Towards a More Inclusive Architectural Library," for \$12,492.60, as well as Marketing and Publicity Grant for \$500. Project also was awarded \$500 co-sponsorship from Humanities Research Institute and a Marketing Grant of \$500
- Was awarded a Library Assessment Committee grant of \$4,400.13 to assess architecture students' satisfaction with Ricker Library spaces, services, and resources
- Made significant progress on diversity and inclusion initiatives and commitments
- Managed a partially remote working environment across our faculty, staff, and graduate students; with development of onsite access, circulation, and protocols for library services and resources
- Continued online engagement strategy to ensure Ricker Library patrons and donors can remain engaged while our collections and spaces are less accessible
- Performed transfers of ~7,500 books and microformats to Main, Oak, and HPNL

Contributions to Library-wide Resources and Services

Diversity and Inclusion

Ricker focused on diversity and inclusion through the FY21 year. We continued to build out the #FromMarginToCenter initiative, which creates a growing body of resources designed to highlight contemporary artists and designers across a broad range of identities, paired with our social media presence which includes over 2,000 followers. Our selection criteria combine staff expertise and interest, current events, and providing a balanced range of resources, knowing that this is an emerging body of material that will evolve and take different shapes over time. Two guides were specifically requested by students: Afrocentric Architecture and Asian American Artists, Designers and Architects, demonstrating our community's interest and engagement with this initiative.

Building on this, we developed a grant project and was awarded an Innovation Fund grant to extend this work to curricular engagement and programming, focused on the School of Architecture. We hired .25 graduate hourly to assist faculty with diversifying their courses, and worked with Professors Aaron Brakke on ARCH 172, Heather Grossman on ARCH 210, John Stallmeyer on ARCH 576, and Benjamin Bross on ARCH 517. We also organized a panel event called "Decentering the Canon in the Architectural Library," which took place March 23, 2021 and featured speakers Charles L. Davis II, Assistant Professor of Architecture History and Criticism,

University at Buffalo, SUNY, Aneesha Dharwadker, Assistant Professor, School of Architecture + Department of Landscape Architecture University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and Leila Anna Wahba, Deputy Director & Culture Curator, Architecture + Design Museum, Los Angeles. The panel drew 200+ registrants and 100+ attendees; the <u>recorded video</u> has been accessed 111 times. We also hired .25 graduate hourly to assist faculty with diversifying their courses.

Ricker has instituted an <u>Anti-Racist Commitments</u> plan. We also committed to making <u>periodic updates</u> on our progress, in order for it to feel like a living document. We were able to make major strides in our collecting efforts on non-dominant voices and cultures working with vendors to identify materials. We partnered with several colleagues in International and Area Studies Library to increase our collecting of art and architecture materials from a more global perspective.

Reference, research consultations, web site, Libguides

We initiated Ricker's first foray into participation in chat reference. Emilee set up consultation hours using LibCal, which were primarily utilized by graduate students. And we also offered in-person appointments for those who needed to consult the print collections.

After the pandemic, our website, libguides, and social media became invaluable tools to creating a user-focused experience for our patrons. We continued to create and realign guides, focusing on those with the most views first. One with ~5,000 views a year was the Art History Theory & Methodology guide, which we updated to be more reflective of current approaches to theory. We also created several Krannert Art Museum guides, with the enthusiastic espousal of the museum's curators. These included Homemade Nettles: Harvest of Memory, and Pressing Issues.

We were also approached by faculty to develop or augment course guides including <u>ARCH 172:</u> <u>Drawing and Modeling</u>, and <u>ARCH 321/521: The Environment, Architecture, and Global Health.</u> Faculty discussed this model as seeing the library as a dynamic place for prospective, current, and former students to find and augment information related to their classes.

Outreach and Engagement; Liaising

Emilee spent much of the four months she worked onsite before the pandemic engaging with liaison areas and building relationships to anchor outreach and engagement activities. She built pathways toward increased visibility of library staff, resources and services. Some of that work was put on pause once the pandemic happened, since much of it relied on an in-person engagement model; however, Emilee was able to pivot to online engagement through the relationships she made earlier in the year. The "Decentering the Canon in the Architectural Library" event was very successful with more than 100 people in attendance, not only from campus but also across the country. Graduate Assistant Tacia Diaz developed and led several zine workshops across campus, partnering with International Student and Scholar Services and La Casa, extending the possibilities of creative practices beyond just art and architecture

students. Emilee also co-sponsored a lecture in the Art History department's Modern Art Colloquium, featuring Dr. Bridget R. Cooks, who lectured on Black women and photography.

Significant Changes and Challenges

The most significant changes were also our most significant challenges. Emilee Mathews started as Head of Ricker Library in November, 2019, only a few months before the pandemic. In September, 2019, assistant librarian Chris Quinn passed away; his position has just been filled in September, 2021. Emilee has spent a considerable amount of time piecing together workflows and procedures, as Chris did not leave detailed documentation on how the library ran; regardless, many policies and procedures needed to be updated to reflect current library management practices. This has created a significant lack in the Ricker library - with one librarian rather than two, the librarian in question very new and untenured, while also facing the vast changes and challenges of COVID19 in the workplace, has created a huge amount of stress and strain throughout the report period. Graduate assistants have been essential to our staffing plan.

- Invited to write and published an article in the <u>Illinois School of Architecture student</u> <u>publication Ricker Report</u>, co-authored with PhD student Soumya Dasgupta
- Organized panel event "Decentering the Canon in the Architectural Library," which took place March 23, 2021. Coordinated graduate hourly efforts to diversify syllabi (see above)
- Supported online teaching needs by filming short videos of various artists books, photobooks, and zines in the collection; created 87 videos in total
- Continued #FromMarginToCenter initiative to highlight underrepresented voices: created Afro-Caribbean Art, Afrocentric Architecture, Asian American Artists, Architects, and Designers, Disability and Art, Inclusive Design, and Pan-Africanism in Art and Literature. These joined the initial 3 guides from FY 20: Black Artists & Designers, Contemporary Latin American Art, and Women-led Architecture Firms

We also employed a total of 5 graduate hourly students, .5 FTE on state funds, and .25 FTE on Innovation Funding, during Fall 2020, and Spring and Summer 2021. The .5 on state funds was devoted to identifying and developing resources pairing anti-racist research with art and design disciplines, which included the #FromMarginToCenter guide Inclusive Design; the Innovation Funded graduate hourly work was devoted to working with faculty in Architecture to diversify their precedents, case studies, and readings. We also employed a total of 2 hourly student assistants .25 FTE in Summer II one which helped with graphic design projects, the second with bibliographic searching.
